# Flight Information

The accuracy and currency of information contained in this guide is uncertain due to the difficulty in obtaining the information and the rapidly changing environment. Aviators should always check with a country's aviation authority or a local aviation handler to determine any specific aircraft airworthiness/equipment and crew/passenger entry requirements.

# **Entry/Exit Requirements**

Entry and exit requirements are for aircraft departing the United States non-stop to country of destination. These requirements do not include any technical stops. Please refer to **Technical Stop** section in **Additional Flight Information** for the country at which the technical stop will be made.

Entry and Exit documentation forms vary from country to country. In general, however, ICAO member countries will accept the following standard ICAO Annex 9 Entry/Exit documents:

- → General Declaration
- → Passenger Manifest
- → Cargo Manifest
- → Embarkation/Disembarkation Card
- → Certificate of Residual Disinsection

Examples of these documents can be found at <u>IFIM Home>General Information>International</u> <u>Flying Overview> ICAO Annex 9 Entry/Exit Documents</u>. The acceptance of these ICAO documents must be confirmed by the appropriate AIS.

## **Entry Requirements (Departing U.S.)**

- → File an eAPIS manifest outbound
- → File and activate international flight plan
- → Land at Saint Martin Grand'Case airport

The following entry documents are required:

#### Passengers -

- → Valid passport
- → Visa for stays longer than 3 months

#### Pilots - Same as passengers

*Note:* Other pilot/crewmember requirements may be applicable in lieu of those stated. Contact appropriate AIS for further clarification prior to flight.

### Aircraft -

- → Noise Nuisance Limitation document
- → Valid airworthiness certificate
- → Aircraft registration certificate
- → Aircraft Radio License
- Licenses and qualifications of crew
- → Instructions relating to rescue operations
- → Aircraft log book
- → Flight manual
- → Copy of Flight Plan
- → Applicable navigation charts
- → Three copies of the General Declaration

### **Exit Requirements (Departing Saint Martin)**

- → File eAPIS manifest if inbound to the U.S.
- > File an international flight plan
- → Call U.S. Customs at filed U.S. airport of entry
- → Depart from Saint Martin Grand'Case airport
- → Three Copies of the General Declaration

# Additional Flight Information

U.S. aircraft airworthiness and certification requirements may not meet other countries requirements. It is the responsibility of the pilot to determine if the aircraft meet those requirements.

The Standards, related to airborne communication, navigation, surveillance and collision avoidance equipment are from ICAO Annex 10 ( Aeronautical Telecommunications) of the Convention on International Civil Aviation.

Differences from ICAO Annex 10 may be found in the free on-line AIP (see Link at bottom of this document)

The items listed below are for pilots' reference to determine if the aircraft meets minimum instrument and equipment requirements of the destination country. Additional equipment may be required to comply with the airspace navigation requirements.

#### **Aircraft Instruments and Equipment**

- → Two way VHF radio
- → Mode C transponder
- > Navigation equipment appropriate to the route flown
- → DME for IFR flight
- → ACAS for large and/or turbine powered
- → Life jacket for each occupant

All aircraft must carry, for each occupant, a life jacket or an equivalent individual device, stowed so that it is easily accessible, when:

- in the case of an aerodyne, the latter flies over a stretch of water at such a distance from the coast that, with one engine failed, it isunable to reach land suitable for an emergency landing,
- in all cases, it is more than 50 nautical miles (92 kilometres) from the coast.

If an aircraft is liable to be at a distance from the coast greater than:

- 100 nautical miles (185 kilometres), in the case of a single-engined heavier-than-air aircraft.
- 200 nautical miles (370 kilometres), in the case of a lighter-than-air aircraft or a multi-engined heavier-than-air aircraft capable of continuing its flight with one engine failed it must carry:
  - → An emergency beacon, floatable and watertight, easily and rapidly accessible
  - → One or more lifeboats, easy to use and sufficient in number to accommodate all the persons on board.
  - → A standard large size signaling mirror
  - → Two red parachute flares
  - → An electric lamp which operates on contact with the water or, failing that, a watertight electric lamp
  - > One liter of fresh water per person on board
  - → Sachets or blocks of fluorocene, weighing at least 300 grams, porous and contained in a waterproof container
  - → A medical first aid kit containing pain-killing, airsickness and cardiotonic medicines, eye-wash, antiseptic products and a dressing kit

### **Technical Stop/ Overflight**

There are no restrictions to any technical stop or overflight for U.S. aircraft.

The request should be received ten days before the date of the flight or one month before the date of the flight, for a series of flights. The request should be made on Form B (Appendix II) as found in the French Antilles AIP, page Gen 1.2-3

#### **Private Flights**

Information mentioned in the flight plan is usually accepted as an arrival notice by the French authorities.

#### **Float Planes**

All seaplanes or amphibious aircraft used as seaplanes must be equipped with:

- A life jacket or an equivalent individual device for each person on board, easily accessible
- → An anchor
- → A sea anchor, if one is necessary to assist in maneuvering

#### **Light Sport Aircraft**

The IFIM staff is unaware of any requirements for LSA aircraft in Saint Barthelemy

### **Fees**

Users should anticipate a landing fee corresponding to the use by aircraft greater than six tons of airport infrastructure and equipment necessary for the landing, taking-off and taxiing, as well as additional services, such as lighting, flight information and visual assistance; the rates for such a fee are based on the certified maximum take-off weight of the aircraft.

A parking fee corresponding to the use by aircraft greater than six tons of parking infrastructure and equipment as well as, if necessary, additional services; the rates for this fee are based on the parking duration, the aircraft features and the parking area features, if any.

a passenger fee corresponding to the use of facilities designed to receive passengers and the public, as well as additional services, if any. The basis of this fee is the number of departing passengers. On the same aerodrome, the price applicable to the same category of passengers is identical for all terminals. However, for terminals put into service after August 1st 2005, differentiated tariffs may be set according to the investment and operating costs relating to such terminals and the quality of services.

A fee for use of fixed facilities for the distribution of aircraft fuel; the basis of this fee, payable by operators of these facilities, is the volume of distributed fuel.

Ancillary fees may be set for other services. The pricing conditions for ancillary fees may be set pursuant to an agreement when they correspond to services of a specific nature that are rendered to some users only.

For aerodromes servicing less than 100,000 passengers, the fee structuring is left to the aerodrome.

Airport fees and charges are available from the aerodrome operator.

Passengers - Yellow fever vaccination is required for travelers arriving from an area declared as contaminated by yellow fever in the WHO epidemiological report. The vaccination should be less than 10 years and more than 10 days.

#### Pets

Dogs and cats require a health certificate issued by a veterinary in the country of origin issued no more than three days before arrival. It must specify that an anti-rabic vaccination is at least one month old and less than six months old before entry.
