This letter report is provided pursuant to Section 544 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018 (Pub. L. 115-254), which requires the Secretary of Transportation to report to Congress the Fiscal Year (FY) dollar amount of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) acquisitions that are subject to the Buy American Act (Pub. L. 72-428, codified at 41 U.S.C. §8301-8305) from entities that manufacture articles, materials, or supplies outside the United States. Additionally, Section 544 requires a FY summary of the total procurement funds spent on goods manufactured inside versus outside the United States subject to the Buy American Act.

During FY 2021, FAA spent a total of \$532,306,430 for articles, materials, or supplies subject to provisions of the Buy American Act. FAA spent a total of \$4,976,939 in FY 2021 for articles, materials, or supplies manufactured outside the United States that were subject to provisions of the Buy American Act. This represents 0.93 percent of FAA's total funding spent for those articles, materials, or supplies subject to the Buy American Act. These products included aircraft parts and avionics, specialized glass products supporting Air Traffic Control Tower cabs, and communication equipment otherwise unavailable from domestic sources. In comparison, FAA spent a total of \$527,329,491 in FY 2021 for Buy American Act articles, materials, or supplies that were manufactured within the United States.


