This letter report responds to Section 544 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018 (Public Law [Pub. L.] 115-254), which requires the Secretary of Transportation to report to Congress the fiscal year (FY) dollar amount of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) acquisitions that are subject to the Buy American Act (Pub. L. 72-428, codified at 41 U.S.C. §§8301-8305) from entities that manufacture articles, materials, or supplies outside the United States. Additionally, Section 544 requires a Fiscal year (FY) summary of the total procurement funds spent on goods manufactured inside the United States subject to the Buy American Act.

During FY 2023, the FAA spent a total of \$713,877,058 for articles, materials, or supplies subject to provisions of the Buy American Act. The FAA spent a total of \$5,708,657 in FY 2023 for articles, materials, or supplies manufactured outside the United States that were subject to provisions of the Buy American Act. This represents 0.8 percent of the FAA's total funding spent on articles, materials, or supplies subject to the Buy American Act. These products included aircraft parts and avionics, specialized glass products supporting Air Traffic Control Tower cabs, and communication equipment otherwise unavailable from domestic sources. In comparison, the FAA spent a total of \$708,168,401 in FY 2023 for Buy American Act articles, materials, or supplies that were manufactured within the United States.

The table below summarizes and compares the total procurement funds spent on goods manufactured within, versus outside, the United States.
