Mechanic Standards and Testing Update

Knowledge Testing

Effective January 2, 2024:

The FAA's testing vendor, PSI Services, LLC, implemented Multi-Factor Authentication technology as a requirement for airman applicants to access their PSI Knowledge Testing accounts. All airman applicants who take an FAA airman knowledge test must comply with this Federal Security requirement.

Effective August 1, 2023:

14 CFR part 65 requires <u>FAA-S-ACS-1</u>, <u>Aviation Mechanic General</u>, <u>Airframe</u>, <u>and Powerplant Airman</u> <u>Standards</u>, to be used as the standard for testing mechanic applicants. <u>FAA-S-8081-26B</u>, <u>Aviation Mechanic</u> <u>General</u>, <u>Airframe</u>, <u>and Powerplant Practical Test Standards</u>, are no longer used as the standard for testing mechanic applicants.

ACS Codes are now the basis for providing feedback on Aviation Maintenance Technician (AMT) Airman Knowledge Test Reports (AKTR) for missed knowledge test questions. However, Aviation Mechanic Learning Statement Codes (LSC) may still be utilized as feedback for questions missed on AMT General, Airframe, and Powerplant knowledge tests administered **before** August 1, 2023.

Oral and Practical (O&P) Testing

Amended regulations to parts 65 and 147 were enacted on August 1, 2023. The <u>Airman Testing Website</u> is updated with information and resources for Designated Mechanic Examiners (DME), mechanic applicants, and managing specialists, including links for DME training, a sample test, and frequently asked questions (FAQ).

As a reminder, effective August 1, 2023:

- Tests previously downloaded from the Designee Registration System (DRS) are no longer valid.
- DMEs are no longer able to download tests from the DRS.
- DMEs must use the new Mechanic Test Generator (MTG) application to access test resources and should continue to post-test results for mechanic applicants.

Incorporation by Reference (IBR) and Ex Parte

We publish updates for the PTS and ACS through a rulemaking process called Incorporation by Reference (IBR). As a result, some communications and information are restricted once this rulemaking process begins, known as Ex parte.
